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DEFENDING THE FREEDOM OF THE PRESS GUARANTEES THE VOICE OF THE PEOPLE



THERE HAS never been a U.S. president like Donald Trump. A political neophyte, he nevertheless correctly read the mood of enough of the American people to be able to introduce the nation to a new form of governance; one that relies on invective,

character assassination and late-night Twitter rants.

He was also astute enough to realize that the American public had in the main lost trust in the veracity of their media news sources. The concept of turning news into a commercial 24-hour commodity increasingly requires more opinion than facts, with 'experts' frequently selected for their political bias rather than meaningful input. Long gone are the days when Walter Cronkite would sign off with the line, "And that's the way it is" and people would believe him.

The way it is with Trump is that facts are a commodity to be molded into the most convenient form to suit present requirements, frequently to be reversed to meet more pressing needs at a later date; for as a narcissist, the truth is what Trump determines it to be at any given time, a fact he has all but admitted on occasions. When you have sycophant supporters willing to peddle the current line, plus compliant social media where thumbs are engaged before brain, it is easy to spread a veil of falsehood and innuendo.

In the main I have withheld comment on the performance of America's 45th president, but his address to the national convention of Veterans of Foreign Wars in Kansas City, on July 24th, went beyond the pale.
